Who We Are

Operating for more than 60 years. Lone Star Legal Aid (LSLA) is a non-profit law firm that now serves as the fourth largest legal aid organization of its type in the United States. The firm provides free civil legal help to low-income persons who have immediate needs but cannot afford an attorney. Headquartered in Houston, the organization operates another 12 branch offices and covers one-third of the state, including 72 counties in the eastern and Gulf Coast regions of Texas, and also four counties of southwest Arkansas, and has an eligible client population of almost 1.5 million at 125% of federal poverty guidelines. LSLA is the only full-service civil legal aid provider in the region, and it offers advice/legal counsel, brief services, self-help clinics, community legal education, and referrals, as well as full representation in administrative hearings and county, state, and federal courts. Practice areas include domestic abuse, health care, housing, employment, income maintenance, unlawful trade practices, education, civil rights, and disaster relief. LSLA also manages special projects, such as food stamp outreach, language access, elder law clinics, and a legal help line. Cases are accepted on a priority basis, and current priorities include: (1) enhancing and protecting income/economic stability; (2) preserving housing and related needs; (3) improving child outcomes; (4) seeking and maintaining safety, stability, health and well-being; and (5) assisting populations with special vulnerability, such as those who have disabilities, or who are elder, homeless or have limited English language skills.



Self-Service Center Superior Court of Arizona in Maricopa County. Information and court forms, domestic violence, family law, guardianship, estate, dependency, and small claims tax appeal.







Helping low-income immigrants find legal help

- A national directory of more than 960 nonprofit immigration legal services providers
- Accurate, easily updatable resource that surpasses printed directories that are rarely updated and become obsolete quickly
- Facilitates referrals, illustrates capacity, links providers across the country
- And it's easy to use!

What it features

- Over 50 points of data collected for each organization including:
- Contact info
- Service area
- Areas and types of immigration legal assistance
- Other legal and non-legal services
- Capacity populations served, languages spoken

What you can do

- Search organizations by state, county or detention facility
- Filter by types and areas of immigration legal services, other service areas, populations served, languages spoken, zip code, and text
- Download, print, or email results
- Map a search result or an individual organization
- Provide feedback and updates
- View in multiple languages



Eligible Organizations

- Must provide immigration legal services
- Attorneys on staff; or
- BIA-accredited representatives on staff; or
- Are a BIA-recognized organization

Ineligible Organizations

- Organizations not providing immigration legal services
- Private attorneys or law firms
- Organizations that exclusively use private attorneys or offer referrals only
- Organizations that have a closed referral process
- Organizations not authorized to practice law

Finding Direct Legal Services:

What is out there and how do we find it?



Military Legal Assistance Services:

- JAG offices or civilian legal assistance officers for any branch of the service anywhere in the continental U.S.
- Specialize in deployment-related issues.
- Can help with only certain legal issues and only people in certain categories of current military service.



General Civil Legal Aid Help:

- Every state has one or more organizations that provide free legal services for people with low incomes.
- They generally limit their services to people with household incomes below 200% of the federal poverty guidelines.



Civil or Criminal Legal Services for Veterans:

 Each Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center has a Veterans Justice Outreach Specialist who works with the court system and local law enforcement to assist justiceinvolved veterans.



For VA-related issues:

- Veterans Service Organizations and State
 Veteran's Affairs offices focus on benefits
 available through the Veterans Administration.
- These offices have non-lawyer advocates who help with disability and other VA-related claims.
